Important works by C.F.W. Walther are available in English in CPH print <u>volumes</u>. Concordia also recently launched a "Walther's Works" <u>subscription program</u>. Yet many other works by Walther are available for free to anyone with a web browser.

This bibliography organizes these online works alphabetically. It also links to them, allowing for quick searching (including searching for sermons within sermon collections, by text and by key words). It includes some notes.

Two cautions: 1) Hyperlinks may become out-of-date in the future. That is one reason for providing more than one link for a few of the documents.

Please read this excerpt from a sermon on the Gospels, if you read nothing else. Believe this with all your heart!
Picture the waiting father and the prodigal son, too.

"In the resurrection we hear that God was not satisfied merely to send his Son into the world and let him become man for us. Yes, it was not enough to give his own Son into death for us. No, when his Son had finished everything which he had to do and suffer in order to earn grace, life, and blessedness for us, God, humanly speaking, because of burning love to us sinners, could not wait for us to come and beg him for his grace in Christ. No, scarcely had his Son finished everything, then he hurried to give to all men the grace merited through the resurrection of his Son, to acquit them all from their sins, and before heaven and earth publicly, really, and solemnly declare them redeemed, reconciled, clean, guiltless and righteous in Christ."
