Read 1 Cor. 2:1-16

The Spirit's Revelation

God hath revealed them to us by His Spirit. 1 Cor. 2:10.

The instruments of the scientist have laid bare many of the secrets of nature. In ages past, men had no knowledge of the tiny creatures of God which we can now see with a microscope. The telescope lets men see into distant spaces which the eye could never reach. But the secret of salvation man cannot discover. It lies hidden in the heart of God. The Bible calls it the hidden wisdom which was kept secret since the world began. The Old Testament speaks of the darkness that covers the earth and the gross darkness that hides the way of salvation from the eyes of men.

But God did not leave the world in this darkness. The things which we did not know and which we could never discover by human wisdom God has revealed to us by His Spirit. It was the Spirit of God who spoke to the Old Testament prophets and told them of the Savior who was to come. It was the same Spirit of God who spoke to the apostles and evangelists of the New Testament and told them what all the things that they had seen in Jesus of Nazareth really meant. Men could know by themselves that Jesus had died., but it was only by the revelation of God that they could know that He had died to pay for the sins of all the world.

Every day we ought to give thanks to God's Holy Spirit. Everything that we know about salvation we owe to Him. By nature we knew nothing of the truth of God. But by the revelation of the Holy Ghost we knew that Jesus loves us, that lie has taken away our sins, and that by His grace we are saved.

Holy Spirit, we thank Thee for having made the way, the truth, and the life known to us. Amen.

Read 2 Peter 1:16-21

An Inspired Bible

We speak, not in the words which man's wisdom teacheth, but which the Holy Ghost teacheth. 1 Cor. 2:13.

When the Holy Ghost made the truths of salvation known to the prophets and apostles, He did this with the intention that they, in turn, should share this knowledge with others. They were to speak these truths to all the world. And their message was meant not only for the people of their own time, but they were told to write down these eternal truths so that through all the ages to come men might read their messages and find in them the forgiveness and the joy and the peace which the Lord Jesus had earned for them by His suffering and death and resurrection. It was in this way that our Bible, the written Word of God, came into existence.

And the apostle Paul tells us in this verse that when he and the other apostles went out to preach the good news of salvation, they did not let their own human wisdom choose the words which they used. The words in which they brought the Word of God to men were chosen under the guidance and direction and control of the Holy Ghost.

The truth which the apostle teaches us here ought to bring us great comfort. It means that the statements of the Bible are not only approximately true, but that we can depend on them completely. When it tells us that the Lord Jesus died for *all* men, and that His blood cleanses us from *all* sin, we know that this little word *all* is also a word of the Holy Ghost. And because it is a word of the Holy Ghost, it must be true. And because it is true, we can be glad.

Lord, let us always trust in all Thy words and promises with joy and gladness. Amen.

Read 1 Cor. 1:18-31

Blind Eyes

They are foolishness unto him. 1 Cor. 2:14.

We are sometimes told that, years ago, when men did not know as much as they know today, it was easier to believe in the Bible. It is said by some that if we want men to accept the Word of God, we must first revise it to make it fit better with the views of modern man.

But there is nothing wrong with the Bible. There is something wrong with men. It is not the Bible that needs to be changed. It is men who need to be converted. We cannot cure blindness by trying to correct the sun so that it will give better light. And it is not true that men no longer believe the Bible because they are more intelligent than people were in days gone by. Men reject the Bible because they are just as wicked as their fathers were.

For in ancient times, too, men refused to believe the words of God. Isaiah preached clearly about the Savior who was to come, but men would not accept His message. He had to complain, "Lord, who hath believed our report?" And it was not a group of twentieth century college graduates but first century Athenians who laughed at the preaching of Paul.

And when men say today that many things in the Bible are foolishness, they simply prove that the Bible is true; for the Bible says that the wisdom of God is foolishness to natural man. It must always seem like foolishness to human reason to say that God died on a cross and that our crimes are paid for by the death of another. And we Christians believe it only because the Holy Ghost has opened our blind eyes.

Heavenly Father, help us always to see that the foolishness of God is wiser than men. Amen.

Read Ezek. 37:1-14

Dry Bones

These bones are the whole house of Israel. Ezek. 37:11.

The children of Israel had become unfaithful to the Lord. They had refused to listen to the warnings of the prophets of God. They had supported instead those false prophets who had told them what they wanted to hear. They were a religious people, but they had chosen their own way to worship God and had followed after false gods. For these sins they had been punished. The armies of Babylon had taken Jerusalem and burned it to the ground. The people of the city had been led into captivity.

In our Scripture reading for today, the prophet Ezekiel compares fallen Israel to a deserted valley covered with the bleached and dried bones of the dead. It would be hard to find a picture more filled with hopelessness and despair. Surely there was nothing that could be done for people who had fallen so deeply. And yet God promised that He would send His Spirit to these fallen Jews and that by the working of the Holy Ghost they would once more become God's people. The dry bones were to live again.

Dry bones may well be a picture of all men before they come to Christ. They are dead in trespasses and sins. They can do nothing to save themselves. They cannot even accept the water of life when it is offered to them. But in the vision of Ezekiel the dry bones lived again when the prophet spoke the words of God to them. The words of the Lord still have the same power today. By the simple preaching of the Word of God the Holy Ghost makes men alive so that they see that they are lost in sin, but saved by the Son of God who loved us and gave Himself for us.

Holy Spirit, grant us always the gift of life in Christ. Amen.

Read Acts 9:1-9

Stiff Necks

I was chastised, as a bullock unaccustomed to the yoke. Jer. 31:18.

When a farmer in ancient times wanted to use a bullock to pull his plows he would first have to get the bullock used to the yoke. The bullock did not want to do the will of his owner. He would throw his head back and make his neck stiff so that the yoke would slip back over his shoulders.

Such a stiff neck has become a symbol of man's resistance to God. Man is as a bullock unaccustomed to the yoke. The Holy Ghost wants to change him and make him a child of God and a servant of the Lord. But every step of the way man resists and makes his neck stiff.

Man does not want to serve the Lord. He wants to serve himself and live according to his own will. When he is told that for this God will punish him eternally, he still does not want to change. He would much rather change God and say that if God is a God of love He will surely not punish so severely. And when this same God in His Word offers man salvation freely, because all that needs to be done to save man has been done by God's own Son, then man again makes his neck stiff and does not want to be saved in this way. He does not want to be a charity case who has nothing but what another gives him and lives alone by grace. So he rebels against God's wrath and he rebels against God's grace. It is only the power of the Holy Ghost that can make men bow in humility before the wrath of God. It is only the Holy Ghost who can make the unwilling heart willing to be saved by grace alone for Jesus' sake.

Lord, break our stubborn hearts to Thy yoke always. Amen.

Read Eph. 2:1-10

The Needle Is Eye

It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle, than for a rich man to enter the kingdom of God. Matt. 19:24.

The English unbeliever David Hume once said that if anyone really believes the Bibles it is a miracle. He was ridiculing the Christian faith., and yet, in a certain sense, his words are true. Men a man realizes that he is a lost sinner, who has deserved only the wrath of God, and that the only hope for him lies in Jesus Christ., who came and did for him what he could never do for himself, then a blind man has been made to see. His darkened eyes have been enlightened by the Holy Ghost. The Bible actually speaks of such a man as having been raised from the dead.

And when the Savior says that it is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle than for a rich man to enter the kingdom, He shows us clearly how great a miracle it is if an unbeliever becomes a believer. It also becomes evident that this work of making a Christian out of a natural man is a work that man can never do. The Lord Himself says that this is impossible with men. But God can do all things. He can make a camel go through a needle's eye. Rich men have been saved. But in any case, whether they are rich or poor, a work has been done that only God can do. A work has been done that is harder to do than to make a camel go through the eye of a needle.

Through baptism and the Word, the Holy Ghost has made us Christians. In our case He has made the camel go through the needle's eye. For that may He be praised forever.

Holy Spirit, we thank Thee that Thou hast brought us to know and to believe with certainty that Jesus loves us. Amen.

Read Ps. 51

A Broken Heart

They that be whole need not a physician, but they that are sick. Matt. 9:12.

It would be rather foolish for a man who knows that he is perfectly well to take a strong medicine regularly. Such a man would surely never waste the time of a doctor by calling him to his bone every day. In the same way, a man who is never hungry will have little desire to eat; and a man who is never thirsty will have little desire to drink.

These statements hold good also in spiritual things. If a person does not knew that he is sick in a spiritual sense, he will never see his need of the Great Physician. If he does not know that he is in constant danger of dying eternally in hell, he will never look for healing from the Savior.

It remains forever true that the Lord Jesus came into the world to save sinners but if a man does not know that he is a sinner, he can never believe that Jesus came to save him. In fact, he will never believe that he needs to be redeemed. He can never believe that he has been saved by the blood and death of God's own Son.

It is for this reason that we must always study the Law of God. As we learn that the Lord demands that we keep all His commandments perfectly, we realize again how far we have fallen short of meeting His requirements. We remember, too, that for all these shortcomings we deserve to be punished eternally. And then, when we see our sickness and our danger, when our hearts are broken and we knew that we are lost, we will see again why we must every day again and again turn to the Lord Jesus who alone can help us and heal us.

Forgotten Sins

I will remember their sin no more. Jer. 31:24.

God has given men the gift of memory. And a truly precious gift it is. We find much joy in reliving some of the pleasures of the past and we treasure the things that keep those memories alive.

And yet memory can become a source of great pain and of much sorrow. "The devil stands in all memories," said Henrik Ibsen as he remembered the sins of his youth, and he puts these words into the mouth of a character in one of his plays, "Me, who to remember dare not, and who never can forget." And it is surely true of all of us that often the sins of the distant past came back to torment us and to make us feel once more the bitterness of a troubled conscience.

But though we may remember, God promises to forget. "I will remember their sin no more," He says. We may not know how the all-knowing God, who knows all the past, the present, and the future, can forget our sins, but this is what He has promised to do. Songs in the Night

God, my Maker,... giveth songs in the night. Job 35:10.

Jesus was the true Son of God, beloved of His Father, and yet He suffered the pangs and the torments of the cross on Calvary. And we are surely no better than our Lord. To us, too, there come times of grief and pain. Sometimes our days are dark with trouble and the night of despair settles over our soul.

Job had lost all his possessions and all his children in one day, and when the load of grief that pressed upon his heart became so great that his words became bitter, his good friend Elihu reminded him of the fact that God gives songs in the night. In the night of sorrow and sickness, the child of God can still sing his songs of joy and praise and thanksgiving to the Lord. Paul Gerhardt had to suffer one loss after another, and yet he could write, "I will sing my Maker's praises and in Him most joyful be; for in all things I see traces of His wondrous love to me."

Children of God can sing in the night and rejoice in every time of trouble because they know that God still loves them. We forget it sometimes, but when we remember that He gave His own Son into death for our sins, we cannot doubt His love. We know that for Jesus' sake our sins are forgiven, and therefore these trials and troubles are no longer indications of His anger. He chastens those whom He loves, and the time will come when He will bring us out of the wilderness of suffering into the promised land of eternal joy where we will sing our songs of praise forever.

The Blessing of the Lord

The Lord bless thee and keep thee; the Lord make His face shine upon thee and be gracious unto thee; the Lord lift up His countenance upon thee and give thee peace. Num.6:24-26.

Today is Trinity Sunday, the day on which the church reflects on the great mystery of the Holy Trinity. One of the earliest Bible passages teaching this doctrine is this benediction which God gave to Aaron.

For over three thousand years the children of God have heard these words in their church services. In the Old Testament, the Priest spoke this benediction over the congregation. To this day these are the last words spoken by the pastor in many Christian services.

These words are more than a pious wish. In commanding the use of this benediction by the priests, the Lord said, "They shall put My name upon the children of Israel; and I will bless them." God promised that when the priest spoke this blessing over the children of Israel, He Himself would guarantee its fulfillment. "I will bless them," He said.

When we hear these words spoken over us today as we end our worship and leave our church, we should take from them the certainty that God the Father will go with us to keep us and to give us all that we truly need for our life on this earth; that God the Son will go with us to keep us in the favor and the grace of God; that God the Holy Ghost will go with us to give peace to our hearts by the daily assurance that our sins have been taken away by the grace of God and by the work of the Lord Jesus Christ. The doctrine of the Trinity is hard to understand but wonderful to believe.

Dew from the Lord

The remnant of Jacob shall be in the midst of many people as a dew from the Lord, as the showers upon the grass. Mic. 5-7.

The "remnant" was a name used in the Old Testament for those Jews who remained faithful to Jehovah. They were the elect of God, the children of the heavenly Father, believers in the coming Messiah. They were the people who had found the same hope and the same joy that we have in our Savior.

This remnant of Jacob, (and we can count ourselves among them), is to be as a dew from the Lord and as the showers upon the grass. During the rainy season in Palestine, the seed that had been sown sprouted and flourished, but in the hot, dry weather that followed the rainy season, the only thing that kept the fields green and growing was the heavy dew that covered the ground almost every morning. Ps. 103

Greater than Our Heart

If our heart condemn us, God is greater than our heart, and knoweth all things. 1 John 3:20.

Our heart condemns us often and tells us that we are great sinners, who have done so many wrong things that we will surely never be able to stand before God. We look at our failures and at our shortcomings, and our heart begins to wonder whether we can really call ourselves the children of God. In times of grief and pain, our heart tries to persuade us that the Lord does not love us and that He is angry with us because we have not done what we should. In those temptations, we sometimes ask ourselves whether our sins have really been forgiven by God and whether we can really hope for the happiness of heaven.

Or God, who is greater than our heart and knows all things? The lower court may condemn, but the Supreme Court of heaven has acquitted us all long ago, when God raised our Substitute from the dead. And we have no right to doubt His Word.

Lord, Thou knowest all things. John 21:17.

A few years ago, an English author wrote a book in which he pictured life under a dictatorship. One of the instruments by which the nation was kept in fear was the thought-screen, by which at any time the dictator could tune in on the thoughts that any one of his subjects was thinking. It would indeed be fearful to live under such conditions.

And yet, at every moment of our lives, the all-knowing God knows all our thoughts. He hears every word that we may speak. He sees every deed that we do. If our fellow-men could look at us and by that single look know all the things that we have done and said and thought throughout our lives, we would be ashamed to walk down the street. But God knows all things. We cannot hide our sins from Him. How that ought to humble us before Him!

Read Ps. 115:1-11

A Majestic God

Who hath measured the waters in the hollow of his hand? Isa. 40:12a.

It is our God who measures the waters in the hollow of His hand. The prophet is speaking here of the waters that cover more than half of the surface of the earth. He has in mind all the rivers and the lakes and the oceans of the whole world. And of all these waters, he says that God can hold them in the hollow of His hand.

Every day the city of Chicago pumps about one billion gallons of water out of Lake Michigan. Yet one cannot notice any difference in the level of the lake. We can scarcely imagine how much water this lake must contain. And yet, if we look at a map, we see that Lake Michigan is a drop in the bucket compared with the Pacific Ocean. There one sees nothing but water for thousands of miles, often thousands of feet and even miles deep.

And just as we begin to understand how great this ocean is, the prophet comes and says that the Lord can measure, not only the waters of this one ocean, but all the waters on the face of the earth in the hollow of His hand.

What a marvelous picture we have here of the glorious majesty of God! And this God is our God. This is the same God who has forgiven us our sins for Jesus' sake. This is the God who loves us, the God who has promised, "I am thy shield." And if this God is our fortress and our defender, of what shall we be afraid? The dangers that threaten us may be great, but He is always greater.

Dear Lord, defend us from all danger and protect us from all evil for Jesus' sake. Amen.

Isa. 40:10-17

Our Great God

Who hath... meted out heaven with the span? Isa. 40:12b

We look into the starry skies and we have no idea of how far it is from east to west. Those who study the heavens tell us that from one end of the universe to the other is about two hundred million light years. This means that if a beam of light, traveling at the rate of 186,000 miles every second, were to start at one end of the universe, it would take two hundred million years for it to reach the other end. The light of the sun, which is ninety-three million miles from the earth, reaches us in eight minutes.

Impressive as such distances are, they would have made little impression on the prophet Isaiah. His God, who is our God too, measures the heaven with the span, that is, He measures the whole universe by stretching out the fingers of His hand.

We are told that there is one star so large that if the earth were in its center, the sun would still be inside that same star. We see that tremendous star as a twinkling light in the evening sky. What do you suppose we look like from there? Small wonder that the Psalmist asked, "When I consider Thy heavens... what is man, that Thou art mindful of him?"

Beside the universe, we are extremely small. Beside God, the universe becomes small. And yet, He who measures the heaven with the span, keeps His eye on the sparrow and counts the hairs of our head. And the greatest wonder of all is the fact that this great God became a baby in a manger that He might save us from our sins. We may be small and insignificant, but the great God loves us. This is our joy.

O Thou great and glorious God, keep us humble always. Amen.

Read Matt. 11:2-6

A Wonder-Working God

Who is like unto Thee, O Lord, among, the gods? Who is like unto Thee, glorious in holiness, fearful in praises, doing wonders? Exod. 15:11.

These words were spoken by Moses as he stood with the children of Israel on the shores of the Red Sea and praised God for the miracles that He had done in parting the waters to deliver them from the armies of Egypt. To them that miracle was proof that their God was far greater than all the man-made idols of the heathen.

Today men often find fault with the miracles and say that they cannot believe them. The real truth is that they do not want a God who is too great. They are afraid of a God who does wonders and works miracles. They are proud of a science that can make two bushels of corn grow where only one grew before, but they are ashamed of a God who can feed five thousand men with five leaves and two fishes. They are astonished at a science that can, after years of research, destroy a few particles of matter, but they reject the God who can create a whole universe in six days. They are happy over a research program that can develop a vaccine for polio, but they want nothing. to do with a God who can cure leprosy with a touch. Isaiah ridiculed the gods of the heathen because they could do so little. Modern man ridicules the true God because He can do so much.

But this God who stands above all things, glorious in holiness, fearful in praises, doing wonders, is our God and our Savior, and the greatest wonder that He ever did was that He loved us and let men nail Him to a cross for our salvation.

Lord, be Thou our God and let us be Thy people always. Amen.

Read Ps. 93

And No Further.

Hitherto shalt thou come, but no further; and here shall thy proud waves be stayed. Job 38:11.

The Lord spoke these words to Job in the time of his great trouble to teach him that God sets a limit to the powers of evil. We do not know what the years hold in store for us, but one thing is sure always. God has not given up His rule over the world. Our Savior still sits at the right hand of God as Head over all things. When He made the oceans, He gave them their place and said, "Hitherto shalt thou come, but no further; and here shall thy proud waves be stayed." So He set the boundaries beyond which they were not to go.

Water that has burst its bounds can cause great destruction. A flooded river may carry away everything in its path. We take notice of the destructive power of floods when we pray that God might deliver us from all calamities by fire and water. But the Bible says, "The Lord on high is mightier than the noise of many waters." It is He who said to the seas, "Hitherto shalt thou come, but no further; and here shall thy proud waves be stayed."

These words of God we may apply to our own lives. When the storms of life rise against us and when the floods of trouble seek to destroy us, then we have the assurance that He, who loved us and gave His blood to wipe out our sins, stands between us and the mighty waves of sorrow and trouble. And He, who walked on the Sea of Galilee and stilled its storms and calmed its waves, also points His almighty finger at the trials that come to us and says "Hitherto shalt thou come, but no further; and here shall thy proud waves be stayed."

Lord, deliver us from all evil, for Jesus' sake. Amen.

A Prayer in Illness
